Allow *late-term* abortion after 20 weeks of pregnancy for *non-medical* reasons, that is in cases of financial or emotional stress? - Yes 12%, No 82%

#### Key findings of this research are:

- 1. A slight majority (51%) of Australians are opposed to abortion for non-medical, that is for financial or social reasons (which comprise 98% of all abortions) and 53% are opposed to Medicare funding in these circumstances;
- 2. An overwhelming majority (95%) of Australians believe that, before having an abortion, a woman should receive free independent counselling and information on the development of her unborn child, the nature of the procedure, the physical and psychological risks of the operation and the alternatives of keeping her child or adoption, so she can make a fully informed decision: and
- 3. A substantial majority (78%) of Australians oppose Medicare funding of late-term abortions (i.e. past 20 weeks of pregnancy) and 67% oppose Medicare funding after the first trimester (13 weeks).


This new research complements and reinforces the findings of the national opinion poll released by Southern Cross Bioethics Institute in May last year, in which 1200 Australians were surveyed by Sexton Marketing Group in December 2004.

Key findings of the Southern Cross research included:


- 71% want greater public discussion
- 76% say men have equal right to public comment (71% of women)
- 87% want number of abortions reduced
- 78% want mandatory counselling
- 86% want this to be independent of the abortion provider
- Only 15% believe abortion is moral when mother and baby are healthy



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### 1. INTRODUCTION

### 1.1. Background

The Australian Federation of Right to Life Associations commissioned an opinion poll among the people across Australia on the issue of abortion. Stage 1 was conducted in April/May 2005.

#### Explanation given to respondents at the beginning of the survey:

Abortion is an operation or procedure which involves termination of an unwanted or difficult pregnancy, preventing the birth of a live child. Approximately 90,000 abortions are performed each year in Australia.

#### **Explanation on Medicare coverage:**

Over the past 35 years, Australian taxpayers have paid for more than 2 million abortions through Medicare and the public hospital system. As approximately 98% of abortions are performed for financial or social reasons, it has been said that abortion is the only elective surgery Medicare covers.

#### **Explanation on Partial birth abortion:**

Partial birth abortion is a method of late-term abortion after 20 weeks of pregnancy which was recently banned in the United States. It involves the abortionist inducing early labour and aborting the unborn child before full delivery is completed.

Market Facts was commissioned to conduct this market research study.

This document details the findings of the research study carried out.

## 1.2. Research Methodology


Wherever variations were observed, comments have also been made on opinions of the residents by household situation and working status of respondent / occupation of main income earner.

### 2. SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

#### Views on the issue of abortion

Over half the adults across Australia believe that abortion involves taking of human life and by 20 weeks of pregnancy, an unborn child is a human person with human rights.

While 60% supported abortion on demand, only about 39% supported abortion for non-medical reasons, which indicates some confusion in the public mind as to what abortion on demand is.




#### Abortion and women/other related issues

Almost 80% believe that abortion has health risks for the woman.


There was near unanimous support for women receiving counselling and being fully informed of all procedures and risks before abortion and the vast majority believe there should be a cooling-of period between the appointment and the actual operation.

About three-quarters were in favour of parental consent for abortion for girls under 16 years of age and the same proportion also supported conscientious objection provisions to allow the medical fraternity to opt out of having to perform abortion operations against their will. Almost 60% support a ban on the late-term partial-birth abortion procedure.



#### Views on Medicare funding for abortions

There was divided opinion on Medicare funding of abortion. More than half (54%) stated their support for Medicare funding of abortion on demand, but 15% of these changed their minds when asked if Medicare should pay for abortions on medical grounds. A slight majority (53%) opposed Medicare funding of abortion for financial or social reasons. Again, this may indicate public confusion on what "abortion on demand" actually means.



#### Respondent profile

The sample was skewed a little more towards women and was spread near equally across the various age groups. It was found that males, as a rule, preferred not to make comment on this topic.


63% of the respondents were residing in the metropolitan areas of the country and the spread across the various states was as per the population pattern existing in the country. 60% of all respondents were working (43% working full time), 11% were engaged in home duties, and about a quarter were retired.

34% of the sample were living alone or singles sharing accommodation, 29% were living as couples and the rest (35%) as families.

### 3. DETAILED FINDINGS

#### 3.1. Views on the issue of abortion

## 3.1.1. Believe that abortion involves taking of a human life




A little over a half of all the respondents interviewed believe that abortion involves the taking of a human life. There were variations across states and regions - with a significantly higher proportion of the residents of Queensland (68%) and those residing in the non-metro areas (59%) expressing this opinion. On the other hand in NSW (41%) and in the metro areas (36%), a relatively smaller proportion gave an affirmative response.

It was observed that many more women (60%) than men (46%) believe that abortion involves the taking of a human life.

It was also seen that a relatively higher proportion of adults who live as families (61%) when compared to singles and couples (52%) believe that abortion involves the taking of a human life.

# 3.1.2. Believe that by 20 weeks of pregnancy... an unborn child is a human person with human rights



Across the residents of Australia, over half believe that by 20 weeks of pregnancy, an unborn child is a human person with human rights. On this issue, the largest proportion of affirmatives came from the residents of Western Australia.

Again a relatively higher proportion of those residing in the non-metro areas (66%) and women (60%) gave an affirmative response.

### 3.1.3. Support abortion on demand




When asked if they supported abortion for any reason whatsoever, that is abortion on demand, as many as 60% said 'yes'. A relatively higher proportion of these respondents were residents of NSW and SA/NT and from the metro regions. A relatively fewer proportion of respondents in Queensland supported abortion on demand (44%) and it was seen that higher proportion of the residents in this state did not express an opinion on the issue.

There were some variations by age, region and occupation of main earner in the household – a significantly higher proportion of those aged 65 and above (44%) did not support abortion on demand. Again more residents from the non-metro areas (41%) did not express their support on this issue. 66% of the respondents who hailed from households where the main earner worked in a managerial or clerical position supported abortion on demand.

### 3.1.4. Support abortion for non-medical i.e. financial/social reasons



However, when discussing abortion for non-medical reasons like financial/social circumstances, a higher proportion did not support it - 51% compared to 32% who did not support abortion on demand. A relatively higher proportion of these respondents were from WA and the non-metro regions of Australia.

39% supported abortion for non-medical reasons, as against 60 % who supported abortion on demand. Many of these people were residents of NSW and ACT and mainly from the metro regions.

A higher proportion of the residents hailing from households where the main earner worked as manager or in clerical/sales positions supported abortion for non-medical reasons (47%).


There were wide variations by age – while many of the younger age group (18-34 yrs-47%) supported abortion for non-medical purposes, a large proportion of those aged 65+yrs (63%) did not support it.


## 3.2.1. Can abortion harm physical/mental health of a woman?



A substantial majority of the residents of Australia (79%) were of the view that there were health risks associated with abortion, that abortion did harm the health of a woman - physical and/or mental. This response was seen across states and metro/non-metro areas. The younger respondents (18-34 yrs – 85%) and adults who lived as families (83%) were significantly more vehement about this.



# 3.2.3. Believe there should be a cooling-off period between appointment and actual operation



The vast majority of the respondents supported the idea of having a cooling-off period between making an appointment to have an abortion and the actual operation. This was stated particularly by a larger proportion in Queensland and SA/NT.




# 3.2.4. Believe that parental consent should be required for girls under 16 having an abortion



Almost three-quarters of all in the survey believe that parental consent is essential for girls under 16 years of age before they have an abortion. Significantly higher affirmations on this issue came from residents of Queensland (86%), WA (83%) and those residing in non-metro regions (80%). However, relatively fewer (67%) of those in ages 18-34 years agreed on this issue.

## 3.2.5. Support conscientious objection provisions to allow doctors/ nurses to opt out of having to perform abortions against their will



Again about three-quarters of all respondents expressed their support on this issue. A relatively higher proportion of those from the non-metro regions said 'yes' to this query. There were no significant variations observed in the response by age, gender or family type.



#### 3.2.6. Partial birth abortion - should it be banned?

An explanation on partial abortion was given to the respondents and they were then asked about their views:

Partial birth abortion is a method of late-term abortion after 20 weeks of pregnancy which was recently banned in the United States. It involves the abortionist inducing early labour and aborting the unborn child before full delivery is completed. Do you believe that partial birth abortion should be banned in Australia?




A large proportion of the respondents (59%) said that partial abortion should be banned in Australia. This response was more vehement amongst those who lived in the non-metro areas (66%). There was no significant variation in response by age or gender. On this issue a fifth of all interviewed did not express an opinion, possibly because they were unsure of what the procedure actually involved.

Information read out to respondents- Over the past 35 years, Australian taxpayers have paid for more than 2 million abortions through Medicare and the public hospital system. As approximately 98% of abortions are performed for financial or social reasons, it has been said that abortion is the only elective surgery Medicare covers.

## 3.3.1. Support Medicare funding for abortion on demand



About half of all adults interviewed supported Medicare funding for abortion on demand. When compared to the others, a relatively higher proportion of the younger age group supported this (60%).

When analysing the information by regions and states, it was observed that a relatively higher proportion of respondents residing in metro areas and from NSW and SA/NT support Medicare funding of abortion on demand. In the states of Queensland, WA and Tasmania, as many as 45% did not approve of this.



Not all who support abortion on demand support Medicare funding of the same – about three-quarters of them support Medicare funding.

# 3.3.2. Support Medicare funding for abortions for non-medical i.e. financial/social reasons



Support for Medicare funding of abortions for non-medical reasons was given by 39% of all adults. Again this response was supported more by those in the younger age group (48%). More than half the respondents expressed a negative response on this. Among the senior citizens (65+yrs), as many as 65% did not think that Medicare should be funding abortions for non-medical reasons. Again a large proportion of the residents of Queensland (61%), WA (63%) and Tasmania (60%) expressed a negative on this.

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### 4. INTRODUCTION

### 4.1. Background

The Australian Federation of Right to Life Associations had commissioned Market Facts to do an opinion poll among the people across Australia on the issue of abortion in April/ May 2005. A few follow-up questions on abortion were required to be asked of the populace. This stage 2 of the survey was conducted in August/September 2005 using an entirely different sample of 1200 people.

This document details the findings of the research study carried out in the second stage.

It should be noted that the Stage 2 questionnaire repeated three introductory questions from the Stage 1 questionnaire, before asking the three new questions (see Research Instrument in Appendix 4).

We have not reported the results of these repeated questions, preferring to use the Stage 1 figures. Suffice it to say that the results of all three questions in Stage 2 were more supportive of the pro-life position than the original sample surveyed in April/May.

# 4.2. Research Methodology

Target Respondents: Men and women aged 18 years and above, across Australia.

**Sample size:** A total of **1200** respondents were interviewed. The following table gives the spread of the sample across the various states and by age and gender of respondents.


### 5. SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

### Stage up to which there is support for abortion

About a third did not support it at all. Of the others, most supported it in the earlier stages of pregnancy. Similar responses were seen for Medicare funding of abortion.


73% of Australians are opposed to abortion taking place after the first trimester of pregnancy, i.e. 13 weeks. Only 6% are in favour of abortion occurring past 20 weeks.

78% of Australians want the time limit on Medicare funding restricted to 20 weeks of pregnancy and more than two-thirds want it reduced to 13 weeks.



#### View on justification of late-term abortion

On the issue of late-term abortion (after 20 weeks of pregnancy), very few – only 12% - were in favour of allowing it for non-medical reasons i.e. for reasons of financial or emotional stress.



### Respondent profile

The sample was skewed more towards women (60%) and was spread near equally across the various age groups.


63% of the respondents were residing in the metropolitan areas of the country and the spread across the various states was as per the population pattern existing in the country.

56% of all respondents were working (35% working full time), 13% were engaged in home duties and about a fourth retired.

27% of the sample was living alone or as singles sharing accommodation, 34% were living as couples and the rest (38%) as families.

### 6. DETAILED FINDINGS

# 6.1. Up to which stage of pregnancy would you allow abortion?



About a third of the respondents opined that they would not allow abortion at any stage. A relatively higher proportion of these respondents were from the non-metro regions and from Queensland. A significantly higher proportion of the older age group (65+yrs - 43%) were not in favour of abortion at any stage.

Of the other respondents, most stated that they would allow it only in the early stages of pregnancy – this response came more from those in the metro regions and those hailing from NSW and WA.

13% would allow abortion up to half way through the pregnancy. Only 6% would allow abortion anytime during the pregnancy – a relatively higher proportion of men and those living alone, gave this response.


A total of 72% of Australians are opposed to abortion after the first trimester (13 weeks), with 85% opposed to late-term abortion after 20 weeks.

# 6.2. Up to what stage of pregnancy would you approve Medicare funding of abortion?

Information read out to respondents - Over the past 35 years, Australian taxpayers have paid for more than 2 million abortions through Medicare and the public hospital system. As approximately 98% of abortions are performed for financial or social reasons, it has been said that abortion is the only elective surgery Medicare covers. Up to what stage would you approve Medicare funding of abortion?



37% opined that they would not approve of Medicare funding of abortion at any stage – in the non-metro areas, this proportion was as high as 47% and in Queensland 43%. Again, a higher proportion of the older respondents gave this response.

Of the others, more than half (overall 30%) approved of Medicare funding for abortion only in the early stages of pregnancy. This response came more from the respondents in the metro areas and in NSW.

11% would allow Medicare funding of abortion up to half way through the pregnancy. 14% would allow it anytime during the pregnancy – a relatively higher proportion of men and those living alone gave this response.



# 6.3. Would you allow late-term abortion for non-medical reasons, i.e. financial/emotional stress?

The following question relates to late-term abortion, which is abortion after 20 weeks, or about 5 months, of pregnancy. In Australia premature babies can survive from 23 weeks, although some babies as young as 20 weeks have survived overseas. Would you allow late-term abortion after 20 weeks of pregnancy for non-medical reasons, that is in cases of financial or emotional stress?



When discussing supporting abortion for non-medical reasons like financial or emotional stress, large majority of the respondents (82%) did not support it.

A significantly higher proportion of these respondents were from WA.

There were variations by gender – with more women (86%) than men (75%) not supporting late abortion for non-medical purposes.

When analysing the data by working status, it was seen that a significantly large proportion of those engaged in home duties (93%) were against this issue.

Among those supporting the case, a large proportion were those living as singles/alone (45%) and males (55%).
